the central figure in a literary work

a figure who plays a lesser role but is still necessary to the plot

a character who does change his/her attitude or personality

a character who does NOT change his/her attitude or personality

He changes his perspective on hunting after he experiences what it feels like to be hunted; Rainsford now understands that animals can feel fear.

Foreshadowing

one event hints at a later event

Effect: creates suspense + interest in the reader's mind

Early Event	Later Event
Rainsford hears gun shots while on the yacht (passing Ship-Trap Island).	This foreshadows that there are people on the island, particularly General Zaroff (hunting).
Rainsford, an expert hunter, hears an unusual shriek and is unable to identify the animal.	This noise provides us with a clue that people are being hunted (not animals).
Zaroff reveals that he relishes the challenge of hunting his new "game."	Zaroff's unbridled passion for hunting hints that he will enjoy the challenge of hunting an expert, Rainsford.

Internal Conflict

a struggle within a character (man vs. self)

Rainsford struggles to keep himself calm and focused by repeatedly saying, "I will keep my nerve."

External Conflict

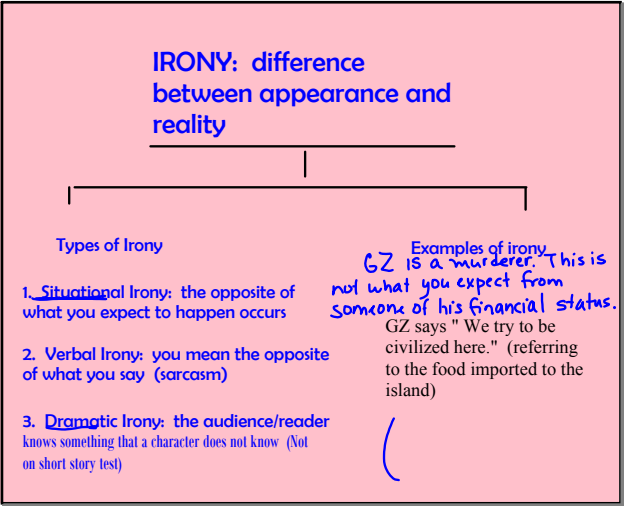
a struggle between a character and some outside force (man vs. man; man vs. nature; man vs. society)

Rainsford struggles to survive against General Zaroff. They have a verbal fight and a physical fight (involving swords).

Rainsford must decide if he will play the game.
